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
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IN MEMORY OF PETER CLAYMORE

Wisdom Project 2030 incorporates the following values in all dealings with members, partners, the public, and local governments:



Our Program:

The Wisdom Project 2030 Program was developed to connect our members to the needs of our community and to improve Hall County through action and advocacy. The program schedules seven full-day and three half-day sessions that lead to a Class Graduation and Celebration. Sessions are normally held between August and November and are designed to provide dynamic, informational interactions with individuals and leaders throughout the Hall County area. Sessions educate and inform participants about the concerns expressed by community leaders and encourage participants to think about ways to improve our community.

2024 Projects

Projects are how Wisdom Keepers work to support Hall County and beyond. Our members initiate projects after learning about problems or opportunities from community leaders. Working together with community organizations ensures sustainable results.

Wisdom Project's TOTAL HOURS spent volunteering in active projects in 2024 was over 2,000 hours, our largest total hours recorded to date! Moreover, this total does **not** include an individual Wisdom Keeper's work outside of active projects, including volunteer activities, collaborations, chairperson's time, or new class time developing project ideas.

We are proud of the following projects that were **completed** in 2024 and the projects that are **still active** and will continue in 2025. We extend our thanks to all Wisdom Keepers who give their time and efforts to improve our community! More information about each project follows.

Objective: Improve Health

Completed Project #1: Looping Everyone In

Hearing Loops are special sound systems that use a magnetic signal to directly transmit sound to hearing aids. This allows the user to hear the sound to the specifications of how their hearing aids are programed. Joy Bolt chaired a team of Wisdom Keepers including Linda Tommy Randolph, Wayne Wilson, Mike Hill, Janice Young, Susan Longley, and Gary Vogel. They worked with Gainesville High School's Theater Department to successfully demonstrate the loop system at a performance preview of *The* Little Mermaid. The Theater Department Director expanded the school's participation to include a lesson on diverse audiences. Attendees at the demonstration included representatives from the Arts Council and Gainesville First United Methodist Church who considering are installation of a hearing loop.

Completed Project #2: Informed Trauma Awareness

Wisdom Keepers Carol Reed, Janie Wolf-Smith, and Deborah Ames worked in partnership with the Hall-Dawson County Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) and Brenau University to expand materials to increase awareness and support for the impacts of trauma, particularly among foster children. They engaged a Ph.D. intern to conduct panel discussions and organize a three-part Zoom meeting Book Club with CASA based on the book, What Happened to You? The team identified resource needs and developed a framework for toolkits to assist foster parents, teachers, volunteers, churches, and others that work with children who have experienced trauma.



The Informed Trauma Awareness project supports foster children and others who have experienced trauma in their lives.

They developed a Digital Resource Book Club on the topic of trauma with Brenau, the University of North Georgia, and Lanier Tech for students enrolled in medical related classes. The Occupational Therapy program at Brenau includes the material in their curriculum and CASA uses the materials in their training.

Objective: Strengthen Community

Completed Project #3: Volunteer Services Database

To support initiatives to increase awareness and support of on-line resources that give access to social service providers in Hall County, Wisdom Keeper **Gary Vogel** worked with "Unite Us," a social care network established between Northeast Georgia Health System and the United Way. The "Unite Us" platform offers electronic referrals and communication between nonprofits and service organizations and helps to connect local individuals and families to the social services they need. It also enables the organizations to recruit volunteers and list any needs of donation items. Gary participated in the 2024 "Hall County's Week of Caring" and will continue volunteering to encourage social service organizations to enroll and enter their services and needs into the "Unite Us" System.

Objective: Lift the Lives of Elders

Completed Project #4: Reading to Adults with Dementia

Wisdom Keepers developed a pilot program with documentation on how to set up and execute a reading program for seniors with dementia at Phoenix Senior Living in Gainesville. The team was led by Bruce Leyton and included Michael Lipsitt, Kathie Wilson, Belinda Dickey, Diane Rooks, Jeff Gorham, Sandee Gorham, and Pat Hammond. The program promotes social engagement and reduces isolation for Phoenix Senior Living residents, provides a new channel and sense of purpose for program volunteers, and establishes measures and metrics to use in assessing program outcomes. Project ownership was transferred to the Beyond Dementia Coalition for further distribution.

Completed Project #5: Improving Long-Term Care Options

Wisdom Keepers began investigating how to bring innovative skilled nursing to Hall County in 2017, based on a personcentered care model delivered in a small home environment where the Elder defines what is "home." Despite early optimism about forming local partnerships to bring this model to Hall County, legislative barriers prevented success. In 2021, the team changed focus to educate lawmakers about those barriers and to advocate for legislative changes to improve long-term care across Georgia. They worked with the Georgia Council on Aging's Co-Age for three years without success to introduce legislation to establish a study committee to examine barriers and identify opportunities to expand long-term care options in Georgia. Efforts to achieve change for Georgians continue through Co-Age. The team was led by Carol Hanlon and included over the years Wisdom Keepers Nan Carvell, Bob Byrne, Diane Rooks, Brad Baucom, Phyllis Shalvey, Kay Reis, Nancy Moore, Louise Forrester, Angela Sparks, Mike Freeman, Ellen Ewing, Steve Naughton, Jen Smith, and Roy Smith.

Objective: Empower Youth

Completed Project #6: Ferst Reader Tutors

Wisdom Keepers Lois Dillard, Anne Horne, Rick Reed, Nedra Byers, Pat Hammond, and Ron Crews, led by Lisa Giblin, researched the possibility to establish a Ferst Readers Program partnership between older students and younger children in Hall County. They had planned through a pilot program to connect older students interested in a future career in education with young children in Day Care and Pre-K programs and have them read together using the Ferst Readers books and resources. The attempted pilot highlighted the need to build support with school system management from the beginning of the project for future implementation by interested teachers and students

Projects Continuing into 2025

Objective: Strengthen Community

Active Project #1 Good News at Noon Community Garden

Wisdom Keepers **Jean Mason** and **Lisa Brown** are working in coordination with the Hall County Extension Coordinator, a Master Gardener, and the Good News at Noon Community Coordinator to develop a community garden at Good News at Noon. In addition to building lifestyle skills for residents, classes will encourage their involvement in the garden and provide Good News at Noon with a variety of fresh vegetables.

Active Project #2 North Georgia Works Meal Program

Wisdom Keeper **Gary Vogel** is leading a group to kick-start a meal program for the men at North Georgia Works, an organization that houses from 30 to 40 men without homes who are working towards self-sufficiency to become contributing members of our community. The team will contact local restaurants and business leaders to solicit their assistance to provide one meal a month for the NGW residents.



Objective: Empower Youth

Active Project #3 Youth Development Hiring Fair

Under the leadership of **Caroline Colonna** and **Michael Lipsitt,** the Career Fair and Expo started as a Gainesville High School youth development project. The goal is to have students apply for jobs and get an interview scheduled at the event. More than 20 Hall County businesses participated with Wisdom Keepers on hand to assist over 200 students in completing applications, rehearse for interviews, and apply for jobs that matched each student's abilities or interests. Plans are in place to hold another fair in 2025.






Our 2024 Volunteer Stars!



Financial Report

Notes:

Wisdom Project 2030, Inc: Wisdom Project 2030 captures the wisdom of Hall County residents, age 55 and older for the good of our community. Our members are graduates of the Wisdom Project Program and are known as Wisdom Keepers.

Descriptions:

General: The financial statements have been prepared under the cash basis accounting: revenues and expenses are recognized at the time cash is received or paid out. Wisdom Project 2030 is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization.

Operations: Management of activities such as insurance, IT and marketing. Member dues are \$55 per year. (103 members in 2024 and 95 members in 2023.) Marketing is directed to the community and potential Wisdom Keepers. Restricted donations are made for a specific purpose by the donor.

Wisdom Project Program: The Wisdom Project Program builds a multi-faceted and dynamic view of Gainesville and Hall County. Six of the sessions are designed to identify ways participants may apply their skills and follow their interests while contributing to our community. In the **Fall 2024 Program**, Wisdom Project 2030 graduated 24 participants who presented several project ideas and who volunteered throughout the community.

Member Meetings: Monthly meetings offer education and fellowship among Wisdom Keepers. During the 2024 year, we held lunch meetings at various locations in Gainesville.

Symposium: Wisdom Project 2030, Inc. and the UNG Center for Healthy Aging will host a community symposium "Living Your Best Life After 55" on March 27, 2025. \$9,500 was received from sponsorships in 2024 along with payments for venue, speaker and books.




